6th Sun. after Epiphany (6th of year)

Catholic Centre Broadcast

Good morning; and welcome to join with us here in the chapel at the Catholic Centre for Mass today. Particularly if you are ill or indisposed, we hope that listening in to the celebratn. of this sample Eucharist here will be a consolation for you and help you to pray together with your fellow-Christians in their prayer and worship of God this sunday morning. Today is the 6th Sunday after Epiphany, and in the scripture readings for today's Mass we continue the more or less sonsecutive reading from St Luke's gospel which is the one being read this year on most Sundays, and from the first Letter of St Paul to the Corinthians which is used on these Sundays between Christmas and Lent. The O.T. extract today is from the prophet Jeremiah, fitting in, in theme, with the Beatitudes of Jesus' sermon on the 'charter' of the new kingdom of God which you will hear in the Gospel extract. The gospel will be read and the sermon given by the celebrant of today's Mass, Fr Patrick McGovern SJ. But before the Liturgy of the Word of God, the first part of the Mass, there is an introductory rite of prayer and repentance which begins now with the singing of an entry hymn as the priest and his assistants approach the altar.

Penit.: Kyrie: Gloria: ORATIO

The prayer for today's assembly concludes the introductory rite; the congregation sit down now to listen to the first of the scripture readings, which is followed by pt. of Ps 1 as a meditation prayer.

Creed:

After the word of God in scripture and the sermon, the congreg. stands to recite, with the priest, a profession of faith in God, the Nicene Creed.

Offert.:

The second part of the Mass, the Liturgy of the Eucharist, begins now in the Offertory rite, where the bread and wine needed for the Eucharist are brought to the altar, and the priest makes a thanksgiving prayer over them. These gifts represent us, our giving of ourselves to the service and love of God in our lives and our concern for people. It's at this point of the Mass that the Collection is taken. CHOIR

Preface:

After the Prayer over the Gifts for today's celebration, the central prayer and action of the Eucharist begins, introduce by an invitation and the Preface for Sundays. The first of the 4 Eucharistic Prayers, the Roman Canon, is being used here today

Per Ipsum:

The Prayer our Lord taught us, the Our Father, now introduces the preparation for Holy Communion and the Communion rite of the Mass.

ommunion:

The verse for the Communion Song: the priest is now receiving in Holy Communion the Body and Blood of Christ, taking first the consecrated Host and then drinking from the chalice, with the prayer 'May the Body of Christ bring me to everlasting life/ May the blood of Christ bring me to everlasting life'. As he does so, those of the congregation who wish to receive the sacrament of the Eucharist begin to file up to the rail in front of the altar, where the priest will come to give them Holy Communion CHOIR

While the priest continues to give Holy Communion, we have some minutes for our own personal prayer and reflection, in which to join in spirit with the people here as they return to their places in the chapel having received our Lord in this sacrament of the Eucharist. You may

like to make your own spiritual communion with Christ our Lord at this time, or say your own prayers; in this quiet period, before the priest recites for us the final thanksgiving prayer of the Mass, perhaps some thoughts and reflection on the scripture we listened to earlier and on this Eucharist we've celebrated today may help you in your prayer. Most of us, I suppose, are more used to hearing and quoting the Beatitudes in the version St Matthew gives; there are, however, some not unimportant differences between his and St Luke's which we heard this morning. For instance, St Luke has our Lord addressing a wider audience than the apostles and disciples alone, and what Jesus says is put more directly and forcefully to his hemrers: "you poor ... you that hunger now ... " The point of contrast with the world, the urgency and uncomplicatedness of putting one's total trust in God is stressed. So is the Christian necessity of sharing with Christ, in His suffering and being scorned as well as in His joy and resurrection. The Beatitudes are nonsense from a point of view that's entirely limited to this world and our present existence; for they are (as is the whole of Christian life fully lived) a reversal of the values of this world. If prosperity, comfort, peace of mind, popularity, are the goals or achievements that make a man fully satisfied with his life, then there is no room in this self-enclosure for God and the life and happiness He offers to men and which is not confined to the span of this mortal life. This is not to say that poverty, hunger, grief, public resentment are in themselves guarantees of eternal happiness; but because the kingdom of God has come among us and the friendship of Christ is present in the world, people who are

undistracted by the consolations and happiness that this world can indeed give are freer and more open to see and accept the gift of God; their need and their capacity to receive the riches of God's friendship and happiness are the greater. The Beatitudes are an invitation as well as a promise: in something the same way the Eucharist too is both promise and present fulfillment, where Christ is present giving Himself to those who will accept His love, life and friendship. When we come together around the table of the Lord, in worship and thanksgiving, in brotherhood with one another and with Christ our Lord, we celebrate the liberation He has brought to us and made us able to recognise and accept. We celebrate His rising from death, "the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep" as St Paul wrote in his letter to Corinth; it's this fact that gives us faith and hope, that there is a way out of just living for this present life and world, that in Christ God has offered His joy and friendship, a fulfillment of our deepest needs and aspirations which can't be met by trust in ourselves or our fellowmen alone. It's this fact that makes the Beatitudes intelligible and acceptable; they are not only an ethical code or high ideals, but for those who put their trust in God a present beginning of the happiness of His kingdom which will last forever. The Eucharist should make us aware of what it is God's love offers us, and of our own and the world's needs which ultimately only His love can satisfy. Our faith and the words of Christ which challenge human wisdom and natural values should be a message of good news to the world; if so many people today who are searching for happiness and are not satisfied to trust in themselves or other men do not find God's love, one reason perhaps is that our lives, We Who

share one faith and one Eucharist together, do not show clearly enough and simply enough the truth of those blessings and congratulations of Christ, the Beatitudes.

The Communions are now over, and at the altar the priest first puts away in the tabernacle the hosts that remain. Then he briefly cleans the chalice and patends that have been used during Mass and Holy Communion, and they are taken away from the altar by one of the assistants. After a few moments of silent prayer and praise to God, the celebrant now recites the concluding prayer for today's Mass.

End: The Blessing and Dismissal form the concluding rite of the Mass; the priest and his assistants now make a reverence towards the altar and return to the sacristy. With the Mass now over, and the congregation beginning to disperse, we end this broadcast which has come to you this morning direct from the chapel at the Catholic Centre in Connaught Rd., Central.






