15th Sun.of Year (8th after Pentecost) Catholic Centre Broadcast

DRATE:

Good morning to you all once again from the little chapel at the Catholic Centre in Connaught Rd. In a few minutes. Mass will be beginning here, and we'd like to invite you listening to your radio to join in spirit with the people here in the celebration of God's word and the Eucharist of thanksqiving, worship and offering on this Sunday morning. If you are ill or otherwise unable to join with your fellow-Christians in their community prayer and praise today, we hope this broadcast of Mass will be helpful and encouraging for you. Today is the 8th Sunday after Pentecost, the 15th in the cycle of the year; and in the readings of Scripture chosen for this Sunday we continue with St Matthew's gospel. hearing this morning our Lord's parable about a farmer sowing seed and His own explanation of His message. The power of God's word and its effectiveness is the related theme of the first of the scripture readings for today, from the D.T. book of Isaiah. A continuation of St Paul's letter to the Romans is the N.T. reading, which fits in neatly with the other two, about the hope of all creation. But before we hear the word of God in the first part of the Mass, there is a preparatory rite of prayer, repentance and praise. which begins now as the choir sings an entry hymn while the priest and his assistants approach the altar.

CREED: After the word of God in scripture and the homily given by the celebrant of this Mass, Fr Cyril Barrett, the Creed is now recited as a profession of faith in response to God's word

OFFERT: The first part of the Mass ends with the prayers of general intereession which you've just heard. Now at the altar, the priest begins the preparation for the Liturgy of the Eucharist — he takes the bread and wine offered in token of our offering of ourselves to God, and says a prayer of blessing over them as he prepares them for the prayer and action of Christ's offering of Himself for us to His Father.

CHOIR

A formal Prayer over the Gifts we offer today ends the preparation for the Eucharist in the Offertory rite. Now the central prayer and action of the Mas begins, in the Prayer of the Eucharist; you'll be hearing the of these special prayers this morning.

PER IPSUM: The central Eucharistic Prayer of the Mass ends, as always, with that offering of worship and prayse to God our Father.

And we continue now, in preparation for the sacrament of the Eucharist, by reciting together the prayer to Our Father taught us by Christ.


COMMUNION: At the altar, the priest now receives in Holy Communion the Body and Blood of Christ in the sacrament of the Eucharist. As he does so, and pauses for a few moments in private prayer, the people in the congregation here who wish to share the gift of Himself, His life and His love, which Christ offers to us in this sacrament, begin to approach the altar-rail where the priest will come to

give them Holy Communion in a moment or two. As they receive this sacrament and then return to their places in the chapel to pray privately and personally, there is time for one's own private prayer and reflection, to which I'd like to invite you now while the choir sings a hymn for Communiontime.


CHOIR

In the few minutes that are left now while the priest continues and concludes the giving of Holy Communion, there is time for a little reflection on this sacrament of the Eucharist and the Word of God, especially the scripture we listened to earlier, if you would like to join with me in this. All of our Christian living is, in a sense, concerned with the Word of God, as the Mass most especially is. For here we both listen to God's word recorded for us and spoken to us in the scripture, and we celebrate God's Word made flesh who came among us to share His life and His love with God has and continues to commicate with the creation He made, to give Himself to His creation; in Christ, He gave and gives Himself most fully and completely to us; and in Christ, with HIm and through Him, sharing His very life in this Holy communion, we can give ourselves to God and join in the most full and intimate communication between God and man. We can do so, and He wants us to do so; but how often do we really do so? We find it hard enough to really listen to what our fellowmen try to say to us --- and there are so many words, words, words in the world today! Our Lord described some of the ways and difficulties with which God's word is received, His message that goes out to everyman in one form or another; like the sower's seed, it falls on all sorts of ground, and doesn't always produce the fruit it is capable of and intended to bear. Like any of His parables, it's easy to apply this one to other people, trying to put them into

one category or another, and forgetting that He's speaking to you and me personally too. There is power, creative power, in the word of God, as the OT reminds us; God speaks and acts (they're very closely related ideas) for a purpose; He reveals Himself, communicates Himself to change and transform us in His love, having made us freely able to bye or to refuse to love. Christ, the Word of God, came into our world to save and liberate it, to bring it all and all of us into the family of God. So our liberation and salvation depend on being united with Christ; and the Eucharist is both a sign of that and, unless we resist and refuse, also brings is about. But as the Word of God is not just to be heard and then forgotten, but listened to and acted by, so khe our Communion with Christ in the Eucharist is not only for ourselves nor an occasional grace, but is also to be acted by and become effective in every area of our lives, to bring about the unity of mankind and all creation in the love of God. The good seed that is sown and falls in receptive soil will produce the fruitfulness the sower intends -- and then the scattered grain must be collected together to make the one bread which will become an offering and sacrifice of all creation. We who listen to God's word and receive His Word into ourselves have a part to play in this unifying and liberating of the world. The Eucharist is too a sign of hope for the future, and with this hope we must work for the betterment of mankind and our world, to spread the good news of God's message and the joy and encouragement of His love. None of us can claim to be perfect yet, and our own lives too need the change and transformation God's word can effect in them. But at the same time, what we've heard and celebrated here this morning only begins here, to be brought by us into the life and part of the world in which we live, to the men and women we live with everyday.





We know that the whole creation has been groaning in travail together until now; and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait for adoption as sons, the redemption of our bodies. — This is the Word of the Lord.

And he told them many things in parables, saying: "A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell along the path, and the birds came and devoured them. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they had not much soil, and immediately they sprang up, since they had no depth of soil, but when the sun rose they were scorched; and since they had no root they withered away. Other seeds fell upon thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty.
