Next time you find yourself admiring a view of the sea, enjoying its beauty, think a little further in a prayer of praise to God, and let the mystery of it lead you to think of who its creator is, what He is like; for to Him you are more important, ~~and~~ everything He gives for your enjoyment, pleasure, fascination can remind you of His love, the greatest gift & power & source of life there is.
