

Our Father (Ress) The Archbishop of Lusaka, Zambia, has recently been at the centre
 FANT. O. 200¹⁵ of something of a storm in his country, and a controversy with the Vatican.
 No, it's not another theologian in trouble with Rome, but a perhaps
 unusual case of Archbishop Ntibaya's extraordinary power of healing — still
 he only accidentally discovered he had rather recently. Seemingly, complaints
 were made to Rome about his frequent use of this healing power, in regular
 sessions he was holding in his house, and the Vatican has cautiously asked
 him to limit his exercise of this gift he has. Now even the head of state
 of the country, Kenneth Kaunda, has intervened on his behalf with the Vatican.
 Archbishop Ntibaya's spiritual writing and his sermons are extremely orthodox
 it seems, and very pastoral. But he makes the point, not a new one, that
 the gift of healing power is in fact not such a rare one, but very often
 suppressed or not recognized in the modern world. For the past few
 weeks I've been thinking about 'hospitality' — much of what I was saying was
 derived or quoted from a little book called "Reaching Out", by a Dutch
 priest, Henri Nouwen. Today, is a final touch on this point, some
 thoughts about from what he has to say about Hospitality and the healing
